### Spring Clean Cymru

Our enthusiastic teams of volunteers have been meeting regularly for community litter picks together with other organisations in the local area. We opened Spring Clean Cymru fortnight (28 May to 13 June) in the town centre and riverbank area, then supported the Woolpitch Wood Community Orchard team on their first ever litter pick and joined with Garden City Community Group for an evening clean-up. Volunteers from Keep Chepstow Tidy and Chepstow and Caldicot Lions participated in a litter pick organised by Keep Wales Tidy in Warren Slade woods and along the Coast Path. Finally on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> June a record 27 adults and children turned out for the Sedbury Community Litter Pick, organised as part of the Tidenham Parish ECO-project with help from Sedbury Space, 1st Sedbury & Tidenham Scout Group, Wyedean School and Wye Valley Greenway Volunteers.



Many thanks to the organisations and individuals who helped to make this year's Spring Clean such a success. On a couple of occasions, we have noticed a reduction in the amount of litter usually found. We hope this may indicate that fewer people are dropping litter - though we suspect that it also has a lot to do with the local heroes who pick up regularly. Well done!

### Transition Chepstow and Climate Warming: 'Wye tackle climate change!'

Climate change is affecting all of us and everyone has a role to play in making sure that we can reach net zero carbon as soon as possible and ensuring a sustainable future. In the run-up to the [COP26](#) conference in Glasgow in November, Transition Chepstow is planning to launch new activities to raise awareness of the issues around a rapidly warming climate and to help people understand what they can do as individuals and in their communities. These include:

- Tree planting in and around Chepstow
- Providing Information for and raising awareness among local communities to help everyone to reduce their carbon footprints
- A competition for schools and youth groups to develop campaign materials about climate change

#### Wye Tackle Climate Change! Competition

The objective of the competition will be to prepare materials for a campaign to make everyone, but especially those under 20, aware of the need for action now and to help identify what people can do in their own lives to reduce their carbon footprints. Where possible, selected entries will be provided with appropriate professional advice and help to work up their contributions into campaigns that can be run in Chepstow and the surrounding communities both before and after COP26.

We expect groups of young people, working through local schools and youth groups, to prepare suitable material using appropriate media, including written material, photographic or visual art, performance art or music, and audio or video and to prepare an outline of a campaign for how this can be used to appeal to different audiences. We will offer prizes to the best entrants in three age categories: junior schools, that is, 11 years & under; 12-15 years old; and those aged 16 and over. We hope to launch the competition in July, for entries to be in by the end of September and with judging to be completed by the end of October.

### Water supply disruption exacerbates ongoing High Beech traffic congestion and air pollution woes

The recent episode of major traffic disruption related to the week-long roadworks undertaken by Dwr Cymru Welsh Water supply repairs located at the Community Hospital A466 traffic junction has caused severe congestion, inordinate delays and health hazardous air pollution, together with adverse economic costs, driver stress and personal frustration. A dire situation further exacerbated by the temporary traffic control being restricted to a confined 4-part single lane sequence. As a consequence, the resultant traffic logjams frequently extended from the racecourse all the way to the notorious High Beech A466/A48 roundabout, a bottleneck junction already regrettably plagued by inadequate and evidently intractable traffic flow mis-management problems.

A thorough reassessment of the legal rules, regulatory policy procedures, and actual practices concerning the implementation of the various water, gas and cable infrastructure utility companies liaising in conjunction with the responsible MCC and related highway authorities, is clearly essential and long overdue. Hopefully the resultant traffic chaos will be carefully minimised in similar scenarios in future. The expectation is that the newly elected local and Senedd politicians will now ensure that the issues are effectively tackled as a matter of urgent priority.

### First sustainable transport plan for a town in Wales

A group of concerned Chepstow residents brought together by Transition Chepstow have worked together in light of the challenges facing the community to identify a range of actions that could be taken to make dramatic progress towards creating a sustainable place to live. The challenges are large in this fast-changing world; from climate change and pollution to societal, economic and technological changes. As a group our initial focus was on congestion in Chepstow but as we campaigned for traffic improvements it became clear through the public meetings that so much more could be done. By doing an inventory of transport related issues our focus changed to considering transport as a whole. This, we felt, was an area that wasn't getting enough focus and that in which we could make a significant difference. The group has created a vision and picture of future travel to guide us in our action planning.
